- a. Why did you decide to study in the US or Denmark as an exchange student?
 - Going to the US to study was a big decision. I wanted to try something study
 wise than I was used to in Denmark. At Aarhus School of Architecture we are
 very focused on the artistic approach to architecture whereas at UW (and US
 in general) there is a more academic background with more literary and
 tectonic focus.
 - Having said all that the main reason I wanted to go was to explore and experience something different than Denmark.

 - After researching the different exchange options Aarhus School of Architecture offered I decided that Seattle was a great place to go in terms of what I wanted to achieve academically. But more importantly it seemed like Seattle would be an awesome city to live in!

 - I was very impressed with the department's computer and workshop facilities. There were literally computers and laser cutters in the studios.

 - The biggest strength of the program was the class structure but it was also very stressful. The quarter is so short and you get so much homework that you sometimes felt like you neglected your studio project which is the most important thing in the end.

 - Dan Stettler was an excellent studio instructor. I would recommend him any time. If you're interested in Japanese architecture I can't recommend taking a class with Ken Oshima enough. He knows everyone and everything worth knowing of Japanese Architecture. I also really enjoyed the drawing class I did with Judith Swain.
