1. Pre-Exchange. Why and Where:

- **a.** Why did you decide to study in the US or Denmark as an exchange student?
 - I have dreamt about going abroad ever since freshman year of college. For my specific major, I needed to take certain classes in order to finish in 4 years. Copenhagen was one of the options I had, so I began the research process. I have a few friends who have visited the city and I received only the best stories about the city, country, and Danes as a whole.
- **b.** Why did you select the program/University?
 - DTU is a highly renowned technical university, so I was excited to see that
 was where the engineering students attend when in Copenhagen. I didn't
 have much say in what university I would be attending, but it made the
 decision process easier on my part.
- c. What were your expectations?
 - I knew Copenhagen is one of the most bike friendly cities in the world, and know I was going to be biking every day. I was also a little concerned with how far I was living from the university at first. I knew the skies would be grey and rainy, so I wasn't going to get my hopes up on seeing the sun for a while. After talking with some of the Danes about schooling in Madison, I found out that schooling was nothing similar to UW-Madison. I had expectations of working hard in class, but not busting my butt outside of class like in Madison.

 program was just starting.

 - For anyone who wants to actually be able to experience the city life of Copenhagen day in and night out, I would highly recommend Tasingagade 29. Although it is a hefty (~35 mins) from DTU, it is a quick 15-20 minute bike to the city center. This makes it the perfect in between housing site.

- The other housing situations are all located on or near campus. I had a lot of friends located there and they said it's nice for class, but they haven't gotten to know the city as well as I have.

 - Before leaving, we had a nice orientation dinner which consisted of meeting some of the Danes. It was hard because not a lot of them were going to DTU so it was difficult to stay in contact with them when I came to Denmark.
 - DTU's orientation week was beyond anything I ever expected. I met some of
 my closest friends from DTU through this first week. At times it seems kind of
 cheesy, but it was worth it to be outgoing and try to make as many friends as
 possible.

2. ACADEMICS:

- **a.** Evaluate the instruction you received. Compare the following to your home institution's system:
 - class registration
 - Very straight forward. Had a scare where I didn't get into one class at first, but I eventually got in.
 - classroom structure
 - I extremely enjoyed the class structure. 2 hour lecture then 2 hour discussion/problems made for a great school day.
 - instruction
 - For the most part the instructors were very good. Only one was difficult to understand at times, but it was never that bad. Very fast moving classes because we only met once a week.
 - teacher/student relations
 - It was extremely nice being able to communicate with the teacher on a first name basis. I have never been able to do this before and made me feel very comfortable in the classroom.
 - grading/exams
 - There are not a lot of grades throughout the semester. Other than a couple projects, most of the grade comes from the final examination. Fairly easy semester until finals.
 - administration
 - I never had to interact with administration other than housing and when my
 email got hacked early on. They were very nice and helped the clueless
 exchange student (me).
 - library, computer, and classroom facilities
 - The library is very nice, but is missing the areas where you can just sit alone in the quiet section. It is great for collaboration but not self-studying. The classroom facilities are quite nice, I have no complaints whatsoever.

 - DTU was very fun to be a part of because it just consisted of technical students. It made it nice to "nerd out" with the other students. DTU was a very high quality university even though it felt like I wasn't doing that much school work. They use more practical and real world applications.
