 - AU only had a single meeting for all the students going to the US which was very general.
 - UW-Madison did a lot to help adjust after arriving. They made a lot of events for international students that provided information and helped students meet each other.

2. ACADEMICS:

 - class registration
 - It was a little stressful because there is a limited amount of spots in all classes
 - It was great that there is so many different and interesting classes to choose from
 - classroom structure
 - It was a mix of bigger lectures and smaller discussion sections
 - In the bigger lectures you mostly listen and take notes and in the discussion sections you have a much more active role as a student and do more group work/projects
 - Greater focus on attendance
 - instruction
 - The professors lead the lectures and the discussion sections are typically led by a teaching assistant (TA)
 - The professors and TA's were all really good
 - teacher/student relations
 - All of my professors were pretty informal, but you have a closer relationship with the TA or professor that leads your discussion class.
 - grading/exams
 - There were 2-3 exams or quizzes in all of my subjects through the semester
 - Grading was based on attendance, assignments, projects and exam/quiz results.
 - administration

 - library, computer, and classroom facilities
 - There was good access to big libraries on campus site
 - Almost no students made use of computers for note taking
 - The quality of classroom and lecture hall facilities differed a lot some very new with very good facilities whereas others were old and less comfortable. But they all had the necessary technology.

 - The quality of instruction was very high. All of the professors were researchers and experts within their field.
 - The instruction was clear and understandable and all students were encouraged to take an active part and to think for themselves.
- c. In general, what did you like best and least about the academics?
 - I liked the discipline a lot, but all the exams made the studying a little bit inflexible
- **d.** Are there any courses or instructors you would recommend to future students?
 - I would recommend all of my courses; PSYCH401, PSYCH 521, SOC357 (methodology) and POLI SCI 170 (methodology)

 - I should have started to look for housing earlier because a lot of students come to UW-Madison in the Fall and it can be difficult to find a room
 - It is especially difficult to find a room just for a semester
 - I lived off campus downtown by the lake and loved it. I can definitely recommend finding housing yourself and not live in dorms.

 - I joined a Facebook group for people renting and subletting rooms and apartments in Madison. I wrote to a lot of people before finally getting a room.

- The UW-Madison campus is big and really beautiful! There is a mix of nature and old and new buildings.
- Madison city is cozy and has a nice size and good location. The terraces by the lakes are absolutely amazing, especially during summer time.
- It is close to both Milwaukee and Chicago and it's easy to get there.
